Desperados under the eaves sheet music

I put some time into this and came to the conclusion that the answer is Because they can. In fact, this is an issue that has been discussed in TreeHugger before, but it's time for an upgrade. Lloyd Alter / CC BY 2.0 Historically, roof overhangs and deep eaves performed an important role, particularly in wet parts of the country: they keep water off the walls and away from the foundations. Ceiling overhang is also a function of the roof slope; the shallower the roof, the deeper it could build the cantilever. Frank Lloyd Wright liked very deep overhangs, so deep that Mrs. Martin hated darwin Martin House in Buffalo because the rooms were so dark and depressing. UPDATE: A commentator says this is a myth and provides evidence. Dominic Labbe In Quebec, where they have a lot of snow and want steep roofs, developed the bell-throwing profile where the roof is steep at the top and then bells at the bottom to get enough cantilever. This kept the snow farther from the house. It was dogma of green construction in the seventies that the overhangs of the roof must be calculated to let in the low winter sun and block the high summer sun. This only worked on the south facade, however, which limited its application. And, as I noted in a previous post, it probably didn't work very well at all. I did not insist on the overhangs of the ceiling in my own house because I wanted a modern look and there were all kinds of technical issues that arose due to the proximity to the neighbors. Unused walls suffer high rates of premature failure of any paint or stain, and premature coating failure. Any professional musician of the day would have tons of colorful scores hidden in piano benches and hidden in boxes. Amateur musicians sponsored traders who sell sheet music for use in homepun entertainment as well, especially during the holidays. The faces of early 20th-century personalities such as Al Jolson, Fannie Brice and Eddie Cantor adorned many early sheet music problems. Later, 1940s stars like Bing Crosby and Dorothy Lamour thrilled fans in colorful illustrated covers. Even scores from The Beatles, The Beach Boys and other newer tracks featuring pop culture icons, such as Michael Jackson, are collected today. The most recognizable stars and songs often have the greatest value with a few exceptions for rarity or attractive cover illustrations. The competition is not extremely fierce for this ephemera as there are plenty of song titles to turn around, but there are some cases of cross-collecting when it comes to sheet music. For example, military-themed pieces are often of interest to military collectors, also known as military collectibles. Broadway music enthusiasts will also look for numerous titles by Rodgers and Hammerstein or Irving Berlin. Sports memorabilia collectors search for music with illustrations with heroes from the baseball of yesteryear. As an example, The Climber's Rag with cameo illustrations from the 1911 St. Louis Cardinals baseball team can sell for more than \$2,000 on the right market. Other buyers attracted by the numerous covers with colorful drawings of beautiful women. Framed and hung on a wall, these can make a lovely accent in the home or office that almost anyone can appreciate. Due to the large volume produced and distributed as noted above, even though they are made of paper and be somewhat fragile as they age, only a few examples of sheet music are really rare. Pieces of music that fall into the Black Americana category are also highly valued when they are in very good and excellent condition. A copy of Moses Gumble's The Hoogie Boogie Dance dating back to 1901 was sold in eBay.com for \$1,400 in 2016. When autographed by notable celebrities, common pieces of sheet music can also jump exponentially in value, as autograph collectors are in the race for those as well. And while not often found, the examples of sheet music dating back to the early 1800s can also be valuable. These are usually simple sheets of handwritten music recorded on paper before the advent of mass printing.
